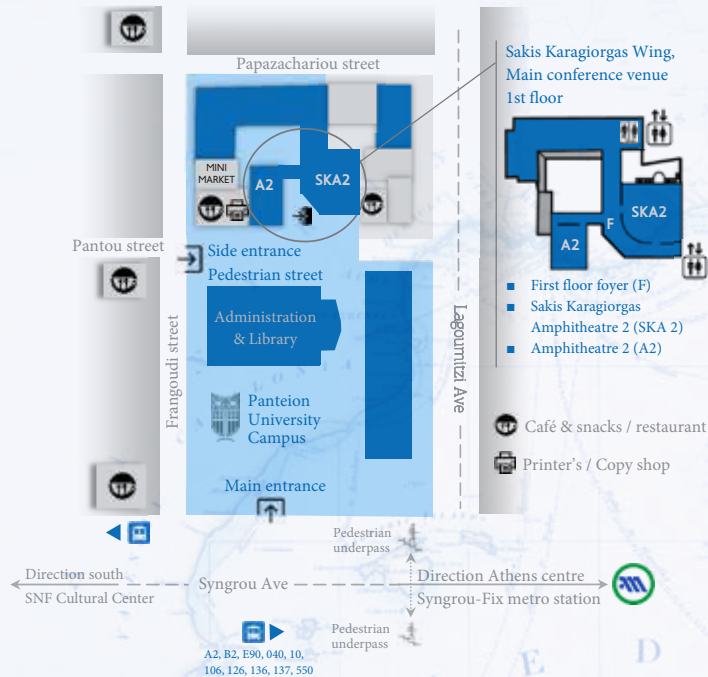
VENUES

CONFERENCE THEME

Capitalism is seen as a phenomenon of global history enhanced by transnational transactions; the conference seeks to re-examine the various forms and patterns of capitalism in the Mediterranean region as an essential concept for understanding modernities.

Considering the pre-eighteenth-century historical experience of capitalist activity in the Mediterranean, we inquire into the existence of Mediterranean patterns of economic modernity in individual or group choices, strategies and profits. We wonder what distinguished merchant and financial capitalism as it emerged in the Mediterranean, after the eighteenth century. What was the role played by political authority (imperial, national, colonial) in capitalist development? How did the natural environment shape capitalist development and how was it been transformed by it? In the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, the Mediterranean world became the area of intense economic activity and political conflict that transcended religious and – since the nineteenth century – national boundaries, and was gradually transformed by the emergence of national economies.

The conference brings together scholars to discuss structures and behaviours and explore continuity and change in the various entrepreneurial paths in the Mediterranean. Other conference topics include: histories of merchant capitalism; pre-industrial and industrial capitalism; pre-capitalist and capitalist agriculture; production and consumption; financial institutions, sovereign debt and financial control; shipping and port economies; mobility and migration networks; class and social structures; race and gender relations; culture and capitalism in the Mediterranean.

KEYNOTE LECTURES

1 Keynote lecture by GARETH AUSTIN titled 'Renewed Histories of Capitalism'

Thursday, September 29th @ 19:00
in the Leonidas Zervas Auditorium of the NHRF

GARETH AUSTIN holds the professorship of economic history at Cambridge University. His research and teaching focus on African, comparative and global economic history. After teaching at a community-financed secondary school in Kenya, he took a BA at Cambridge and PhD at Birmingham. His past employers include the University of Ghana, the London School of Economics, and the Graduate Institute of International and Development Studies, Geneva. He served as general editor of the *Journal of African History* and was one of the proposers of the *Journal of Global History*. His publications include *Labour, Land and Capital in Ghana: From Slavery to Free Labour in Asante, 1807-1956* (2005); *Labour-Intensive Industrialization in Global History* (ed. with K. Sugihara, 2013); and (ed.), *Economic Development and Environmental History in the Anthropocene: Perspectives on Asia and Africa* (2017). His work has appeared in many journals, including *Business History Review*, *Economic History Review*, the *Journal of African History* and the *Journal of International Development*.

2 Keynote lecture by COSTAS LAPAVITSAS titled 'Hegemony in Modern Capitalism'

COSTAS LAPAVITSAS is Professor of Economics at the School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London. His research during the last few years has focused on the Eurozone and the financialisation of capitalism. He has published widely in the academic field, taught at several well-known universities, and writes for the international and the Greek press. His most recent books include *The State of Capitalism: Economy, Society, and Hegemony* (Verso, 2023), *Capitalism in the Ottoman Balkans*, with P. Cakiroglu (I.B. Tauris, 2019), *The Left Case Against the EU* (Polity Press, 2018), *Against the Troika: Crisis and Austerity in the Eurozone*, with H. Flassbeck (Verso, 2015) and *Profiting Without Producing* (Verso, 2013).
